THE FUTURE OF OUR KIDS

Working from the position that nuclear testing is overly interpreted through a historic lens, *The Future of Our Kids* re-orients our focus towards present and future actions. The title is taken from a banner held by women in the Rongelap atoll to greet the Rainbow Warrior. It read 'We loved, the future of our kids'. As a future-oriented phrase, but in an unusual past-tense, the banner has become a touchstone for recognising the multiple timescales underpinning anti-nuclear movements.

The Future of Our Kids responds to two concerns; firstly, the ongoing political challenges the Pacific faces to seek recognition from culpable governments and the threat of nuclear waste seeping into the waters. The second is Aotearoa's own history of anti-nuclear testing activism, the most well-known event being the 1985 bombing of the Rainbow Warrior. While a significant catalyst in galvanising New Zealand's anti-nuclear position, it has become a historicised event, divorced from the present. Yet, for many across the Pacific, their nuclear moment has not ended.

This exhibition brings together works from two international artists; Jane Chang Mi (Honolulu; Los Angeles) and and Torika Bolatagici (Melbourne). Together, their works reflect an intergenerational approach that priorities future political, personal and sociological wellbeing. How we understand the past in the present moment is vitally informed by concerns for future generations.

PORTAGE 19

The Portage Ceramic Awards are Aotearoa's best-known survey of contemporary ceramic activity. Established in 2001, the awards are a hallmark event for Aotearoa's ceramics community, showcasing some of the best work currently being made, and serving as a platform for dialogue about developments in the ceramics field. The awards are open to all New Zealand artists and are a key outlet for new work and new voices.

Well-known Australian ceramic artist and educator, Merran Esson, was the judge of the 2019 Portage Ceramic Awards. Esson has worked internationally for more than 40 years, with exhibitions in The Victoria and Albert Museum, London, Galerie Rosenhauer in Germany, Gaffer Gallery in Hong Kong, as well as being an exhibitor and visiting artist in Korea, Taiwan, Sweden, Pakistan, Spain and Japan. But this has been her first visit to Aotearoa.

"I was searching for a sense of the human hand and of the thought processes that the maker may have had," says Esson. "I was looking for knowledge and experimentation with process, clay manipulation, firing results; in other words, how concept and technical skills created the work."

Esson has selected 55 works from a total of 256 entries. The Premiere Portage Ceramic Award for 2019 was awarded to Mark Mitchell. Merit Awards were presented to Blue Black and Kylie Matheson.

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HANDSHAKE 5: IN SITE

For the Auckland edition of the fifth HANDSHAKE series, *HANDSHAKE 5: in site* brings together ten jewellers from across Aotearoa for an exhibition that explores the potential of jewellery in large-scale spaces. While jewellers commonly dress the body as an intimate, typically small-scale process, for this exhibition the artists work with the dynamic architectural spaces of Te Uru's purpose-built gallery as a springboard for ideas - testing the spatial qualities of contemporary jewellery.


With materials spanning wood, metal, found object, video projection and virtual reality, *HANDSHAKE 5: in site* presents the culmination of almost ten years of learning through the HANDSHAKE programme, which has provided a platform for individual growth and a broader experience of cultural and artistic exchange.



TERM 1 WORKSHOPS PRIMARY AND INTERMEDIATE

Exhibition: Theo Schoon

View a diverse range of prints, paintings, photographs and hand carved gourds by Theo Schoon alongside other well-known artists including Paratene Matchitt and Gordon Walters. We'll think about the way artists respond to different cultures to generate their own concepts and discuss the difference between inspiration and appropriation. We'll look at Theo's intricately carved gourds and learn about the Māori legend of Hine-pu-te-hue the peace maker and kaitiaki (guardian) of the hue (gourd).

Design your world: T-shirt

Create a unique t-shirt design thinking about identity. Combine drawings, symbols and text that reveal your interests, cultural diversity and individuality using mixed media onto a paper template with a fabric component to highlight your unique designs. (Yrs. 2-8, Te reo Māori, social history, English and visual art strands DI, CI, PK, UC).

Identity Triptych

Create an expressive artwork that reveals aspects of identity using text, images, symbols, as well as a self-portrait print. Start by creating a silhouette of student's hands to fill with text relating to favourite activities, whanau and cultural connections, then create a visual pepeha of the places they identify with, complete with a mini self-portrait print. (Yrs. 3-6, technology, Te reo Māori, English, social history and visual art strands DI, CI, PK, UC).

Community Connections tandem visits

Start off your year with a tandem visit to Titirangi Library and Te Uru. This class is especially designed for junior years to get an introduction to their local community and environment. Starting at the Titirangi Library, listen to stories that reflect our beautiful forests and the Manukau Harbour, then visit Te Uru to create a striking mixed media landscape. (Yrs. 0-2, Te reo Māori, English, science, social history, and visual art strands DI, CI, PK, UC).

Te Uru and McCahon House Museum tandem visits

Students have the opportunity to view contemporary art at Te Uru followed by a tour of McCahon House in French Bay. With the cottage only a five-minute drive from the gallery, why not visit both at once?

Early childhood

We now provide gallery visits and workshops tailored to meet the needs of the preschool years. Take a tour of an appropriate exhibition followed by a hands-on workshop in our Learning Centre.

Guided gallery visit

View a range of contemporary artworks spread across five unique gallery spaces. Students will be encouraged to interpret different artworks, considering key ideas, materials and techniques.

Open Studio: Drop into the Learning Centre

Create your own special gourd print, inspired by Theo Schon's intricately carved gourds and the Māori legend about Hine-pu-te-hue, the daughter of Tane and ataua (goddess) of peace who helped to diffuse the anger of the gods after the separation or Ranginui and Papatuanuku. Start with embossing a foam plate with an outline of a gourd shape to fill with your own unique designs to ink up and print from.

Educators Art Development is a series of open, artsintensive classes designed to up-skill early-childhood through to primary school teachers, as well as other art educators in specialist areas.

Identity Mandala

Create a geometric mandala learning about different types of surface painting techniques while you explore your own identity and culture. We'll combine symbols and text inside geometric shapes to highlight with pastels then sgraffito cold wax and clay tiles to complete. These brightly coloured geometric artworks will reveal your identity and culture in a creative format where you will focus on colour balance, layering and texture, and how to manage these exciting new media in a classroom environment.
