portage²⁰₂₀ ceramic awards

2020 marks the 20th anniversary of the Portage Ceramic Awards, which has become Aotearoa's premier showcase for ceramic practice, organised annually by Te Uru.

The challenges that have arisen this year from the Covid-19 lockdowns in Aotearoa have meant that a competition is not possible. But this will still be a special year. This year's exhibition will display winning works from all previous years, spanning large scale installation to fine porcelain sculpture. Each year, the Portage Licensing Trust has purchased the premier award winner for their collection, and this will be the first time all winners have been publicly displayed together.

In association with the Titirangi Potters Club, an exhibition of work by the late Peter Selwyn (1935-2019) will be displayed in the gallery's street-front window space. Presented alongside Portage and NUku.

NUku brings together both emergent and established artists as well as members of the Māori clay artist collective, Ngā Kaihangā Uku. Combining the concept of nuku, uku and inherently referencing Papatūānuku, NUku is an exhibition of ceramics that celebrates collaboration and culture from an indigenous perspective. Whakapapa enriched, each artist brings their unique contribution, sharing a united passion. Together we are more.


BRUCE CONNEW: A VOCABULARY

Over several recent years, photographer and artist Bruce Connew has roamed the many memorials and gravestones of Aotearoa's colonial wars to seek out *the texts on these testaments to folly. A vocabulary of colonisation.*

These remnants are scattered across mostly Te Ika-a-Māui North Island, residual memory, misremembered, not remembered. And there are those who know the Imperial story only too well. (Bruce Connew)

A Vocabulary is an abstract, narrative selection of images from an artist book of the same title, published concurrently with the exhibition. *A Vocabulary* (Vapour Momenta Books, 2021) is designed by Catherine Griffiths and Bruce Connew, with a māteatea and essay by Dr. Rangihīroa Panoho.

TERM 1 WORKSHOPS

PRIMARY AND INTERMEDIATE

We now offer three different types of workshop delivery to select from. You can either visit Te Uru and go for a gallery tour with a hands-on workshop, or we can visit you with our Art in a Box lessons or try our new Art in a Bag workshops. This is a new option where we send you a comprehensive lesson plan with everything you need to facilitate an interactive workshop in your classroom.

Tidal treasure

Visit Te Uru and be transported back in time with *The Thrum of the Tide*, a multi-media installation by Eugene Hanson and Jenny Gillam who were recent recipients of the Auckland regional parks artist in residence programme. During their residency they delved into past histories of the wild west coast landscape of Whatipu, narrowing in on the story of Te Ana Ru cave. They have captured a sense of place for this well-known landmark, combining science, technology, taonga pūoro and tidal audio recordings, while reimagining the legendary dance floor that may lie five meters below the sand surface.

We will respond to the exhibition by creating mixed-media tidal treasures that evoke a relationship to this unique cave and its rich, layered history and identity. (Yrs. 2-8, social history, science, technology and visual art strands DI, CI, PK, UC)

Selfie cartoons

Explore the incredible caricatures of Anna Chrichton. You will be amazed by her wonderfully quirky way of capturing people. This will be a fun way to start your year thinking about identity and upskilling cartooning/drawing skills in a unique mixed media artwork all about you. (Yrs. 1-8, social history, identity and visual art strands DI, CI, PK, UC)

Art in a Bag option: kākahu/cloak

Create a special classroom kākahu learning about the history and significance of traditional Māori cloaks. Students design a unique set of stylised symbols to place inside triangular feather shapes that relate to their own identity. We can send this out to your school with everything you need for this lesson plan. (Yrs. 1-8, te reo Māori, social history, technology, and visual art strands DI, CI, PK, UC)

HIGH SCHOOL AND TERTIARY

Te Uru Autumn guided tour

Join us for an in-depth tour of Te Uru's autumn exhibitions with our knowledgeable curator or director. We will include projects by Shannon Te Ao, Ana Iti and a collaboration by Eugene Hansen and Jenny Gillam. These exhibitions share an interest in history, identity, stories and connections to the landscape with an emphasis on Māori perspectives. We will interpret and unpack our own ideas about identity and shared histories.

3D flowers


Become more confident with 3D while learning how to combine specialist media together with innovative techniques to create a 3D flower sculpture using clay, plaster and recycled materials.
