

FLOURISHING WITH THE BIRDS

For those of you who are gallery members and received this newsletter in the mail, you may have noticed it is no-longer plastic-wrapped. When we last reformatted our newsletter in 2016, we started to use a biodegradable cello-wrap, which is no longer available, and non-recyclable plastic is simply not an option in our current age. Similarly, Te Uru has just completed a full upgrade of our IT systems thanks to the availability of pre-loved equipment through our supplier, Imagetext, who will also arrange for our old computers to be deployed for charity work in Africa. The future of our planet depends on this kind of sustainable approach to waste and consumption.

As we go to press, our current Matariki exhibition includes a carving of Tiriwa, the ancestral guardian of the great forest that once covered West Auckland – Te Waonui a Tiriwa. It reminds us of the following whakatauki (proverb): look after the manu (birds) and the ngahere (forest) flourishes; if the forest flourishes, the birds flourish. Or, if we treasure our environment, then we will flourish too. It is a symbiotic sentiment that becomes increasingly pertinent as we consider the implications of kauri dieback on our wider ecology, as well as the ongoing threat of climate change.

This consideration of co-dependence in an eco-system is thinking that can be put to many applications. In the aftermath of the recent (second) shocking fire at the Glasgow School of Art, the subsequent closure of the nearby Centre for Contemporary Arts (CCA) is having a significant impact on the surrounding community, including businesses. As a contrast to the usual good news stories we like to use, it is a stark illustration of how the wellbeing of a community can flourish if there is a healthy arts ecosystem. Support your galleries and you will do well too – make submissions, become a volunteer, sign up as a member, consider a donation or even a bequest. Who knows what great things will come if we all look after each other?

Maureen Lander — Flat-Pack Whakapapa



Just as whakapapa (genealogy) reflects someone's lineage and biology, the starting line of a kete determines how its patterning and size will develop. In *Flat-Pack Whakapapa*, Maureen Lander has created three installations that explore the connections between whakapapa and raranga (Māori weaving). Approaching these forms of human connection from a mātauranga Māori (Māori knowledge) perspective, Lander engages with weaving techniques—including whiri (braiding) and whakairo (patterning)—and the concept of aho tuku iho (ancestral lines handed down continuously from generation to generation).

Building on the notion that our whakapaka is always with us, Lander's installations can be packed down into individual weavings: easily carried around, reconfigured and added onto later. Her approach symbolises how whakapapa grows with us, and how our genealogy is

inherited by our descendants, who continue our heritage lines. This representation of whakapapa as mobile supports the idea that despite whanau migrating away from their tūrangawaewae (the place they belong to through their whakapapa), hapū and iwi into the wider world, their birth right means they always carry their culture with them.

Flat-Pack Whakapapa will also include two new installations made in collaborations with local weavers and school children. Developed both during and over the course of the exhibition, these new works continue Lander's interest in how to address customary ideas in a relevant way for a new generation.

FROM THE SHORE

From the Shore considers the influence of Māori filmmakers Barry Barclay and Merata Mita on a current generation of artists. Barclay and Mita were forerunners in making films by Māori, about Māori, for Māori. Through their work in film, television and writing, Barclay and Mita set out some core concerns of indigenous filmmaking internationally, ranging from control over production through to community-based models of filming and upending technical conventions, such as staged interviews.

From the Shore brings together contemporary works that echo Barclay and Mita's strategies and philosophies. The exhibition takes its title from Barclay's metaphor of indigenous cinema as 'a camera on the shore' that reverses the direction of the colonial gaze. Conscious of film as a political tool that can be used differently, the selected artists move between subverting conventional tropes and aiming for a fuller representation of indigenous people, places and ideas. Together, the works suggest an ongoing resonance of a rich indigenous film whakapapa and its generative potential for image-making today.

FNVOYS ONWARDS

In an age of instant internet messaging, postcards offer a personal, individually-created, intimate artwork for the hands of another to hold and absorb.

In 1993, the Association of Women Artists initiated a celebratory exhibition of postcards to mark the 100-year anniversary of the winning of emancipation by New Zealand women. Now, in 2018, in the 125th anniversary year of that achievement, Te Uru and representatives of the association will be re-showing the original postcards and inviting a new generation of women artists to create postcards.

The aims of the project from 1993-96 remain unchanged: to strengthen the voice of women's common concerns, to acknowledge the universality of their gender, and to generate images from the present that will touch future generations. By acknowledging the common concerns of women, this project honours past endeavours and supports future generations.

All postcards from the 1996 and 2018 exhibition will be archived as a boxed set as part of the formal winding up of the Association.

PORTAGE CERAMIC AWARDS 18

The Portage Ceramic Awards are Aotearoa's best-known survey of contemporary ceramic activity. In 2018, they will be judged by American artist, Bari Ziperstein. Ziperstein is at the forefront of a thriving ceramic scene in Los Angeles. As well as gallery-based exhibitions and site-specific public installations, Ziperstein also produces functional ceramics through her company, BZippy & Co.


The fresh insights offered by each year's judge has been a signature of the awards since its inception. It is important for the vitality of the scene that it continues to reassess its own ideas and assumptions with diverse perspectives coming from as far and wide as possible, whether that be Jingdezhen, Wales, Sydney or Whanganui.

Established in 2001, the Portage Ceramic Awards is a hallmark event for the New Zealand ceramics community, showcasing some of the best work currently being made, and serving as a platform for dialogue about developments in the ceramics field. The awards are open to all New Zealand artists and are a key outlet for new work and new voices.

TERM 4 WORKSHOPS PRIMARY AND INTERMEDIATE

Kauri Explorations

Be inspired by the Waitākere Ranges, explore our local forest habitats and learn more about kauri and kauri dieback. Using mixed media we will bring a kauri tree to life. Each visiting class will also receive a free Kauri Project poster that will inform you about kauri die-back disease. As extension for Years 5 and 6, you can also visit McCahon House to see how Colin McCahon might have seen the kauri trees represented in his famous paintings. (Yrs. 1-8, English, science, history and art)

Geometric Imprints

Taking inspiration from Maureen Lander's exploration of whakapapa (genealogy) through weaving, we'll create artworks that can be connected as a collaborative installation in your classroom. We will focus on symmetry, balance and form to create a panel of three small artworks that connect geometric shapes using drawing, printmaking and paper cut-out techniques. (Yrs. 1-8, English, te reo Māori, maths, history and art)

Clay Creepy-crawlies

Create a museum-inspired panel focused on an insect that lives in the Waitakere Ranges. First we'll sketch an insect, building up tone and texture with pencils and finish with ink. We will then sculpt a clay insect from unfired clay, exploring texture through different types of clay tools and embellishing materials. Lastly, we'll glue the drawing and clay insects onto a darkened card backing board to mimic a museum display. (Yrs. 3-8, English, science, and art)

Te Uru and McCahon House Museum tandem visits

Students have the opportunity to view contemporary art at Te Uru followed by a tour of McCahon House in French Bay. With the cottage only a five-minute drive from the gallery, why not visit both at once?

In this workshop, we'll focus specifically on the image-rich but low-cost printmaking technique of woodcut prints. In this introductory course, you will carve and make a print in class while gaining the confidence and knowledge to print from home.

Birds have played a significant role in the histories of many cultures throughout the ages. As messengers and guardians of the land, birds are a constant reminder that we are not alone, and that within each of us is a song that connects us to home. In this workshop with artist Charlotte Graham, participants will discover a range of wet and dry media and are encouraged to observe the delicate nature of birds through gestural mark-marking
